Story

There was once a young girl who was brave and fearless, she climbed trees faster than the boys, she explored creation with an enthusiasm that made her mum squirm when she founds bugs and beasties in her pockets at night, she was always ready for the next adventure until it came to bedtime.

Then, she became a girl of habit using every technique to delay the moment the light went off. First it was a story, then she remembered she had not cleaned her teeth, then she had to say her prayers after which she needed the toilet, then she needed a drink, anything to delay that moment when the light went off because fearless by day, she was afraid of the dark.

Her mum would sit patiently, telling her she was not alone, explaining that God was always with her, but it rarely made any difference. Then one night the girl said she wanted a God with a face. Her mum asked her what she meant, and the girl replied that she needed to be able to imagine God and she couldn't because he did not have a face, she had never seen God so how could she imagine him?

Her mum held her close and shared how she saw God in the kindness and love around her and in the beauty of creation. She told her daughter that God as in everything she explored during the day and God was around her in the wind that rustled in the trees in the night, the rain that pattered on the windows at night, if she listened, she would hear God and she could remember what those sounds looked like in the day and know God in her heart.

The girl snuggled down and closed her eyes, listening with a smile on her face as the lullaby of creation rocked her sleep.

Reflection

During my training we had the opportunity to visit Bromley-by-Bow URC. It was a sprawling building sat amidst tower blocks and streets of desolation. The church was small, eight to ten members, but

through the inspiration of a minister they had created a place of beauty and creativity for the whole community. The sanctuary had been converted into a space for a playgroup with storage all around the sides but in the centre was a worship hub with five pews forming a pentagon and above was suspended a tented ceiling. It was a tangible reminder of the presence of God in the day to day life of building, and on Sundays the pews were moved back to form the worship space. Just a taste of the creativity that is Bromley-by-Bow URC, there is a community café, a medical centre, a garden centre, as well as community workshops all of which speak of God' love.

Sometimes we, like the little girl in the story need a tangible reminder that God is with us and although God is not 'a person with a face' we can see God in the face of a friend or in the beauty around us. at the time of our reading from Isaiah, the Israelites were in exile in Babylon and they had been there some time. They were surrounded by Gods and there were graven images of these Gods but they were awakening to the very real presence of their God with them even though they did not have an image to worship. The exile is almost over, and they are facing a long journey back 'home', some 700 miles to be walked. Many today feel that the church is in exile and we face a long walk back home, but as the Israelites discovered on their return to Jerusalem things change and you can never go back to what was. This passage from Isaiah was about inspiring the Israelites to leave exile, to move on to the next stage in their journey with God and we need that inspiration as church and as individual. We long to leave the exile of Covid but we must recognise that it will not be the same, we have travelled in a different way and seen and experienced a different world we take that with us when we move into the new normal, the new way of being church.

Our inspiration is the Jesus way, and we glimpse this through the pages of the New Testament, through the gospels and letters that show how early Christians were inspired by the ministry of Jesus. The passage from Mark's gospel is intriguing not least because it tells us that Simon Peter was married, he had a mother-in-law. I wonder what his family thought when Simon abandoned them to follow Jesus, after all he had been a fisherman bringing in wages and suddenly there were no wages and no Simon. What did Simon think when he realised Jesus meant to travel widely? It is a reminder that the way of Jesus can mean hardship for us and for those we love, it is not a journey to take lightly. Back to Mark 1 and there are six points worth noting:

- Jesus power came from God.
- Jesus took time to be with God, to commune.
- when people were 'healed' by Jesus, they began to serve Jesus.
- the disciples would have been happy for Jesus to stay and heal others, there were plenty of people needing healed, but Jesus moves on, always looking for fresh opportunities.
- Jesus points to wholeness words and actions, body and soul were to be healed, we too must minister to spiritual as well as bodily needs.
- the majority of people who flocked to Jesus gathered because they had heard what he
 had done and they wanted him to do the same for them they did not come because
 they loved him, or because they had caught sight of some great vision, they came
 because they had a need. It is not that people don't believe in God they have simply
 not discovered their relationship with God, that is what we have to help them with.

To discover how we do this we need to tease a little more from these points.

Jesus was aware of his connection to God in creation, and that awareness brought a power and authority to his words and actions. We are also connected to God, but we do not yet have the same awareness of the connection and have yet to discover the power of that connection, but we can, and I hope we will. It will change the world and the path to the discovery is the way of Jesus.

Just as Jesus took time out to rest in God's presence, we also need to make time to sit and be, allowing ourselves the space to listen to God and be refreshed and inspired. If we are always busy, always doing, we struggle to discover ourselves and our own personal relationship with God and that means we have less to offer others as we reach out to them.

We might also miss our own 'healing' and so our response is not what it might be. The motto of the Salvation Army is 'Saved to serve', and later in Mark we read that Jesus came 'not to be served but to

serve'. It is a reminder that our response to recognising God in our lives is to share God's love through 'serving' others, putting the needs of others before our own needs, and this is what we see Simon doing early in his call when he leaves his family to follow Jesus.

Following Jesus involved travel, we are to go out. Jesus could have stayed in Capernaum and built a reputation as a healer, but he did not. He knew healing was only one way of showing God's love and his call was to awaken people to a new way of understanding God. The way of Jesus is to reach out, to travel and find people to talk to, and share with the message of God's eternal love. One to one conversations make us think as we try to explain our understanding of God, just as the mum in the story had to find a way to explain God's presence to her daughter. We have to draw on our experiences and put them into words, paint a picture of God for others to see.

The mission of the church involves body and mind, we are often very good at serving the bodily needs of others, but do we see spiritual needs within the mission of the church? Wholeness, the fullness of our humanity, is a whole life experience. The way we do worship has become a barrier to many who are searching for meaning, they need a place to sit and talk, to listen to how others equate experience to God's presence, to find inspiration through the interpretation of scripture relevant to todays' understanding of the world. We have placed a dividing line, a separation, between worship and mission which is not evident in the early church and which is at odds with the wholeness of body and mind.

Our introduction to many is in offering hospitality, providing for physical need, and that is really important. However, it is only the introduction and we also need to offer hope in the form of knowing God and recognising the interconnection of the whole of life with the whole of creation. It is this which will ultimately build the kingdom. How can we do this?

Paul gives us a clue in his letter to the Corinthians when he talks of becoming a Jew to serve the Jews, becoming like someone outside the law to serve those outside the law. We are called to experience life in all its hues and colours, to step outside our comfort zones and become the other, even if only for a short time. We cannot help people if we do not walk in their shoes. We often say we are hungry, but we know there is food around the corner. Some fast for a day but know that the end is insight. What does it feel like to be hungry with no promise of food or to be forced to fast because there is no food? That is just one example, there is a fine line between empathy and sympathy and mission begins with empathy and empathy begins with listening.

We are called to conversations. Some of the most memorable conversations I have had have been with people who needed to defend their lack of faith, and often what was revealed was a misunderstanding of God, or of the church. I would listen and ask questions and then I would share my experience, my understanding, being careful to say that this was simply my understanding and there were other ideas and other understandings. In this way I have sown the seed of God's love. I thoroughly enjoyed going into primary schools to do assemblies, but the challenge of doing secondary school assemblies raised the bar and yet brought so many rewards. I would reach out, talking about a song or a film that was popular and sharing the questions it raised for me and how I began to try and place those questions into the perspective of my understanding of God. I believe they appreciated the honesty, and the vulnerability and they responded by welcoming me and rewarding me with spontaneous applause, and I hope they took the questions away to ponder for themselves.

I answered a call to share my understandings, to open doors in people's experience through which they might glimpse God and find a little bit of themselves, a call to invite people to experience God rather than reject God because the church has wrapped God up in 'humbug'. I am called to share the message not the doctrine and to use my own experience, my discovered understanding, and normal words to do it. It is the call we all feel when we choose to walk the way of Jesus, a call to reach out and make connections, connections that build the understanding we are called to share, connections that build relationships. It is a call to serve and the good news is that we can answer that call in so many different ways and conversations can still happen while we are separate.

Then Jesus took a cup of wine, gave thanks and said, 'this wine is the new covenant, whenever you drink it remember me.' (Lift cup)

Loving God, in this cup we remember the promise of eternal life in your oneness. As we drink this wine reveal in us your Spirit that we may journey in love, remembering that the light of Christ gives new life to all and helps us see things afresh.

Having shared together we commit ourselves anew to the way of Jesus, the way of love. May our lives be witness to oneness, and our words and actions be witness to your love, in Jesus name Amen.
