The Kingdom of God will be fair and be loving, everyone having as much as they need; no hunger or thirst, just a sharing and caring where everyone's valued for all that they bring.


The Kingdom of God will be justice and freedom, everyone sharing so all can grow strong; no envy or fighting, no greedy dictators, instead all will flourish because we are one.
